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A Message from FASA's President



Good Afternoon FASA Members and Friends,

On March 8, 2011 the Florida's legislative session began. It is so very important that all of our voices are heard in Tallahassee and Washington D.C. Many issues are beginning considered; advocates and experts are forecasting devastating budget cuts to many programs.

Governor Rick Scott released his [\\$65.9 billion budget recommendations](#) and some of his proposals for early care and education are promising. For example, the Governor is recommending more than \$45 million to restore nonrecurring school readiness funds and more than \$72 million to restore nonrecurring federal funds for Florida's Voluntary Prekindergarten (VPK) program. In fact, he included an additional \$10,458,142 to address projected enrollment growth for VPK. Governor Scott also proposed increased funding for Healthy Start Coalitions and children's mental health services and kept current funding levels for the Florida KidCare and Healthy Families programs. This is a start and we must continue to

support programs that enhance the quality of care for Florida's youngest citizens that have no vote. While we understand that budget cuts are inevitable to restore our economy, we hope that the Legislature supports Governor Scott's early care and education proposals. These are challenging times and we know that cuts to children's services don't easily heal.

Unfortunately, there remains no mention of After School in any of the legislation or funding streams for this very important and critical age group. Please remain unwavering in your commitment and let your elected officials know that investments in school age children and education programs are yielding a significant return. Families need quality child care so they can get to work and stay at work! It is critical in shoring up Florida's fragile economy.

Friday, May 6th is Provider Appreciation Day! This is a day set aside to recognize child care providers, teachers, and others that tirelessly care for children and youth of working parents. It takes a special person to work in this field and the contribution these individuals make to the quality of children's and families' lives too frequently goes unnoticed. Provider Appreciation Day offers a unique opportunity to recognize and commend the unselfish dedication, commitment and compassion that child care providers demonstrate every day.

Many governors throughout the country are commemorating Provider Appreciation Day by issuing an official Governor's Proclamation. We are confident that Governor Rick Scott will sign this proclamation in Florida that affirms the importance of our early learning system as a whole and recognizes the individuals who serve children and families every day.

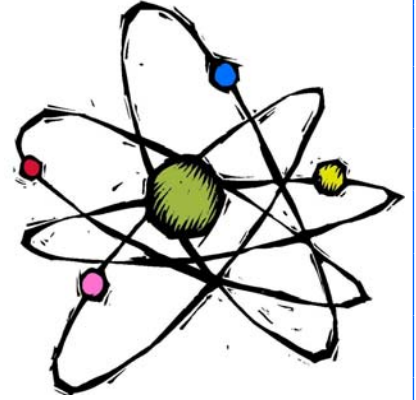

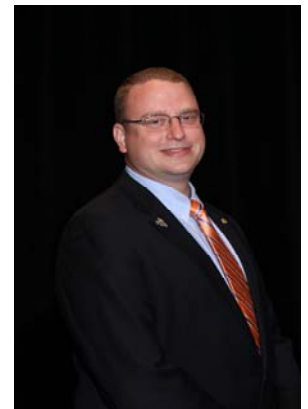

Attend 2011 Children's Week April 3-6, 2011

Over the past 15 years, the only broad-based promotion of children and family issues in Florida has been Children's Week. A true grassroots event since its inception, Children's Week is supported by over 80 different non-profit, corporate, philanthropic, faith-based, state agencies and organizations. Children's Week develops and implements over 200 community events and activities statewide, bringing thousands of parents, children, policy makers, professionals, community leaders and concerned citizens together to share valuable knowledge and information about children's issues in each community across the state and at the State Capitol.

The week is full of events for advocates across the state. The activities include:

- **Hanging of the Hands** - The official kick off of Children's Week on Sunday, April 3. Hundreds of volunteers from across the state will hang over 100,000 paper cut-outs of children's hands that are decorated and collected at child care centers and schools in Florida. The Capitol Rotunda turns into an amazing display of children's art. The hands remain in the Capitol Rotunda the entire week as a reminder to legislators and advocates that we must take care of our most precious commodity; our children.
- **Community Innovation Awards Luncheon** - On Monday, April 4, policy members, elected officials and community leaders will come together to recognize collaborative efforts on children's issues in communities statewide. The luncheon will be held at the University Center Club from 11:30 a.m. - 1:30 p.m. The 2011 Children's Week Community Innovation Award winners will be honored and recognized.
- **Advocacy Dinner & Reception** - Also at the University Center Club, the Advocacy Dinner & Reception will be held Monday, April 4, from 5:00 - 8:00 p.m. The dinner honors Children's Week partners and non-profit organizations who dedicate their lives to children. The evening features live entertainment, a decadent dinner and reception, and the opportunity to network with more than 350 advocates, policy makers and business leaders. The winner of the 2011 Chiles Advocacy Award will be announced, highlighting an instrumental child advocate in Florida.

"Children's Capitol for a Day" - The State Capitol Rotunda and the Capitol Courtyard will be transformed into the "Children's Capitol for a Day" on Tuesday, April 5. Thousands of children, parents, advocates, community leaders and policy makers from throughout the state gather for a day of educational and interactive events and activities. Teachers and students are encouraged to bring their students to the State Capitol for a field trip to learn about the legislative process, meet with policy makers and enjoy a fun and informative atmosphere of learning. Tours of the Capitol can be taken, legislators will read books to children at the Legislative Reading Corner and a healthy boxed-lunch from Crispers will be provided to all students and schools that RSVP to attend. Additional "Children's Capitol for a Day" events include a press conference and Hanging of the Hands Dedication Ceremony, a Youth Advocacy Workshop, as well as a "Teens Only" Town Hall Meeting where selected student panelists will ask important questions to legislators and policy makers regarding the future of Florida's children.

21st CCLC News

The Florida Department of Education is pleased to announce the release of the 2011-2012 Request for Proposal (RFP) for competitive projects for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers program (21st CCLC), Authorized under Title IV, Part B, of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), as amended. Florida's 21st CCLC afterschool programs are designed to help students throughout Florida meet state and local academic achievement standards in core academic subjects, particularly those who attend low-income, low-performing schools through educational and enrichment opportunities. In addition, 21st CCLC programs provide youth development activities, drug and violence prevention programs, technology education programs, art, music and recreation programs, counseling and character education to enhance the academic component of the program.



The funds will be awarded through a competitive grant process based on the implementation of high quality, research-based academic improvement practices, through collaborative efforts, and meeting the grant criteria.

Living Healthy - Taking Care of Caregivers

Breakfast, Snacks and Other Goodies

It's a cycle that often repeats as a result of busy lifestyles: skipping breakfast, then binge eating later in the day on sweets or other high-fat, high-calorie snacks. Here's a better way:

Make Breakfast Your Ally:

You can't beat breakfast. Nutritionists say it supplies large amounts of necessary vitamins, minerals and other nutrients you just don't often find in lunch and dinner.

And if you think skipping breakfast is a good way to cut calories, think again: Studies show that breakfast eaters tend to be leaner than non-breakfast eaters. Fact is, they take in less fat and cholesterol all day. And they also tend to get more fiber, which may reduce risk of serious diseases like heart disease, cancer and diabetes.

Easy breakfast: low fat granola with fruit and yogurt, whole grain cereal with, milk low-fat bran muffins or whole-wheat toast with low-fat cream cheese.

Snack the Smart Way

Done right, snacking can be a great way to fill in needed calories and nutrients during your day. And feeding hunger pangs with low-cal nibbles every few hours can also help prevent overeating, control weight and possible lower blood cholesterol and control blood sugar.

Simple snacks: whole fruit, rice cakes, low-fat crackers. Low sodium instant soups, air popped popcorn or a handful of unsalted dry roasted peanuts.

Treat Yourself, Too

Of course, don't deny yourself the occasional candy bar or bag of cheese puffs. Just make them the exception rather than the rule-you'll actually enjoy them more.

April is National Autism Awareness Month

Autism is a complex developmental disability that typically appears during the first three years of life and affects a person's ability to communicate and interact with others. Autism is defined by a certain set of behaviors and is a "spectrum disorder" that affects individuals differently and to varying degrees. There is no known single cause for autism, but increased awareness and funding can help families today.



In December 2009, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention issued their ADDM autism prevalence report. The report concluded that the prevalence of autism had risen to 1 in every 110 births in the United States and almost 1 in 70 boys. The issuance of this report caused a media uproar, but the news was not a surprise to the Autism Society or to the 1.5 million Americans living with the effects of autism spectrum disorder. Nonetheless, the spotlight shown on autism as a result of the prevalence increase opens opportunities for the nation to consider how to serve these families facing a lifetime of supports for their children.

Currently, the Autism Society estimates that the lifetime cost of caring for a child with autism ranges from \$3.5 million to \$5 million, and that the United States is facing almost \$90 billion annually in costs for autism (this figure includes research, insurance costs and non-covered expenses, Medicaid waivers for autism, educational spending, housing, transportation, employment, in addition to related therapeutic services and caregiver costs).

What is Florida KidCare?

Florida KidCare is a new health insurance program for Florida children age 0-18. There are several types of insurance within KidCare to meet the needs of your child.

Who's Eligible?

- Children age 0-18 who don't have health insurance now
- Your child may be eligible even if both parents work
- Families may make application for unborn children prior to the birth of the baby so that coverage can begin at birth

How Do I Apply for My Child?

The application process consists of completing a simple, one page form.

How Much Does It Cost?

- Fees vary—some families pay \$20 a month, some pay more, and some pay none at all

What Types of Things (or Benefits) Are Covered by Florida KidCare?

- Doctor's visits
- Hospital care
- Prescribed drugs
- Lab tests
- Behavioral or mental health

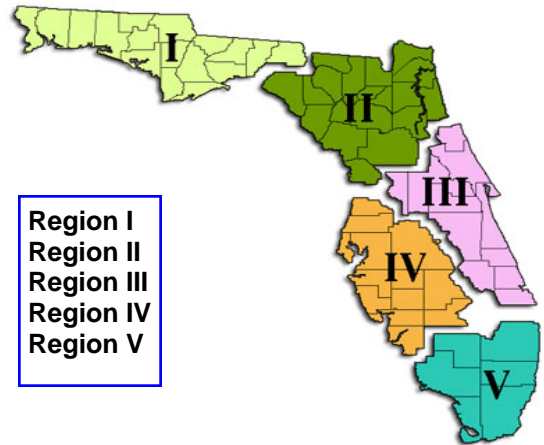
